Move Your Body FOR 1 CORINTHIANS 8-13

The Holy Ghost gives us good feelings when we follow Jesus Christ. Paul called these blessings the fruits of the Spirit. We can share those blessings with others.


- 1. On each fruit, write one blessing of the Spirit listed in Galatians 5:22–23 (for example, love, joy, peace, or gentleness).


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

Hello from THE USA!


Laksmi lived in Hawaii and now lives in Utah. Here are some facts about those two states.





The USA has families from all over the world. In the 1800s, most of the Latter-day Saint pioneers who traveled to Utah were from other countries.





The Laie Hawaii Temple was the first temple built outside of Utah after the Saints moved west.



NATIONAL PARKS

The USA has 63 national parks. Arches National Park is in the deserts of Utah and has 2,000 sandstone arches. Haleakalā National Park is in Hawaii and has a volcano.



ACTIVITY

HOW LOW CAN YOU GO?

This game is played at big parties called luaus in Hawaii. To play, have two people hold each end of a stick up high. The others take turns bending backward and walking under the stick. About 10 percent of the world's pineapples grow in Hawaii. Pineapples represent welcoming and hospitality.



A FRIENDLY STATE



Hawaii is called the Aloha State. That's because *aloha* means "hello." Hawaiians are known for being friendly.

GRILLED PINEAPPLE

- 1. Peel and cut **1 fresh pineapple** into rings.
- Put pineapple in a large plastic bag with 3 tablespoons melted butter, 1/4 cup honey, 1/2 teaspoon salt, and a bit of hot pepper sauce. Seal the bag and shake it. Let it sit for 30 minutes.
- 3. Cook each ring in a grill pan or on an outdoor grill for 2–3 minutes on each side.





"But what if we forget?" Madeline asked.


"Then we have to say sorry and try again to be nice," said Josiah.



What Are Anxiety and Depression?


Sometimes people have feelings of worry or fear that won't go away. This is called **anxiety**. They might also feel sadness that won't go away. This is called **depression**. Anxiety and depression are illnesses that affect the mind, like other illnesses affect the body. People who have anxiety or depression can get help from a doctor. We can love them and try to understand and help them. If you are struggling, talk to a trusted grown-up for help.



Why Do I Feel Anxious?

One part of your brain is called the amygdala. Its job is to protect you. But sometimes it works too hard. It can tell your brain there's danger, even when you're safe. That makes you feel anxious. When you feel this way, you can learn to help your brain focus and calm down. Try the steps below.



Tabitha's Miracle





Tabitha was a follower of Jesus Christ. She sewed clothes and coats and did many kind things for others.

The prophet, Peter, went to Tabitha. He raised her from the dead with power Jesus Christ gave him.






Tabitha was alive again! She could sew and serve again too. It was a miracle.
