Employment Services	<u>Visit Website</u>	A person must create or have an existing Church account. Anyone, member or not, may access the site with an account. Search by school and then filter by <i>Funding Assistance</i> . The <i>Article Index</i> provides articles on how to pay for school.
BYU-Pathway Worldwide	<u>Visit Website</u>	Students are eligible to receive a <u>tuition discount</u> of 10%, 25%, or 50% off their tuition balance (amount based on need). Returned missionaries from the past 60 months are eligible for a <u>25% tuition discount</u> . Scholarships can be combined.

Keys to Success Scholarships	<u>Visit Website</u>	This Ken Garff foundation is focused on high school seniors and has a fun incentive program that uses the College and Career Readiness tool to apply for scholarships. It is also open to adults seeking college opportunities or career changes. Both programs are easily accessed on phones.
Ensign College Single Parent Scholarship	<u>Visit Website</u>	Members of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints will receive 120% of their tuition charge. Non- members will receive 60% of tuition.
SUU—Finish Line Scholarship	<u>Visit Website</u>	Focused on student who completed PathwayConnect from BYU-Pathway. Students get up to 100% tuition funding for four semesters. It is determined by Pell Grant eligibility. A student must be completing their first bachelor's degree.

Waivers and scholarships awarded through SLCC have a legal residency require- ment. Those listed as non-SLCC scholarships may have no legal residency requirement.

College/University Website		Check the financial aid and scholarship pages of the institution you are interested in attending.

Completing applications for financial aid can be time consuming and confusing. When considering using a service to help find financial aid, research the company carefully. Determine if they are reputable and if they can provide the results they promise. Warning signs to look for include when a company:

- Guarantees to find you a bigger pot of financial aid.
- Invites you to attend "free" seminars, which can turn out to be high-pressure sales pitches.
- Promises parents an edge in the competition for college aid.
- Promises to turn up scholarships that you can't find elsewhere.
