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Help Your Children Succeed in School

Welcome

This parent guide will help you learn how to help your children learn in school and at home.

Children learn from parents and teachers. They also learn through work, play, and the questions they ask. Families are very important and help children learn. When families support children in learning, children feel happy and good about themselves. They also want to learn more.

Talk with your family about the things you learn as you read this guide. Pray for help from Heavenly Father. Even if you do not have a lot of education, you can still help your children learn. The Lord will help you and your children learn together as you work, play, talk with each other, and read.

How to Use This Guide

Parents can study this guide together, with their children, or with other parents. Church leaders can invite parents to meet and discuss the topics in this guide. Ministering brothers and sisters can also talk about the topics in this guide with the families they serve.

How to Study Each Topic

Follow these steps as you study each topic in this guide:

1. Invite others to study the topic with you, or study the topic alone.
2. Think and talk about the questions.
3. Read and do the activity.
4. Think and pray about what you have learned.
5. Talk about what you have learned with your family.

Education Is Important

Questions to Talk About

Learn

Education is part of God's plan. In the scriptures it says, "Seek ye out of the best books words of wisdom; seek learning, even by study and also by faith" (Doctrine and Covenants 88:118). As we learn and grow, we will learn more about God's plan for us.

Jesus Christ is an example of a great learner. The scriptures teach us that Jesus "increased in wisdom" (Luke 2:52). Heavenly Father will bless you and help you learn. He will bless your children as they learn and follow the example of Jesus.

President Gordon B. Hinckley taught that "education is the key that will unlock the door of opportunity" ("Let Virtue Garnish Thy Thoughts Unceasingly," *Liahona*, May 2007, 116). This means that education can help you and your children learn new skills. It can help you teach others and take care of your family.

Learn

Parents care for their children in many ways. You bless your children every day by helping them learn. When children learn, they feel good about themselves and want to learn more.

Other people can help your children learn, but parents are children's first and best teachers. You can help your children know that they become more like our Heavenly Father and His Son, Jesus Christ, as they learn.

Your children see what you do. When they see that you make time to learn, they will know that education is important. There are many ways you can continue to learn:

- Study the scriptures.
- Read books.
- Talk with people about news around you and in the world.
- Get more training to do your work better.
- Get more formal education.
- Learn new skills.

Think and Pray

Learn

Teach your children that we are children of God. We all can become like Him as we learn and grow. Help your children understand they can succeed in school because they are children of God. The ideas below will help your children succeed in school:

Focus on School

Help your children go to school and be on time. They should try to go to school every day and prepare for important exams.

Try Your Best

Teach your children to try their best and not give up when things get hard.

Be Obedient

Teach your children to obey the commandments, their parents, and the school rules. They will be blessed because they are obedient.

Ask for Help

Teach your children to ask for help and learn from others. Pray with them when they do not understand how to do something.

Talk Together

Talk with your children, and let them know they can come to you for help. Ask them about things that are hard for them. Work together to solve problems.

Believe in Yourself

Help your children believe in themselves and think good thoughts. When children think good thoughts about themselves, they feel like they can succeed.

Think and Pray

Make Goals to Help Your Children Succeed

Questions to Talk About

1. Look at these pictures. What do you see?
2. Why is having goals important?
3. How do you feel when you complete a goal you have made?



Learn

If you want to solve a problem or do something, you need to decide how you will do it. This is called making a goal. Helping your children learn to make goals will help them succeed.

You and your children can make a goal in four easy steps:

1. Discover
2. Plan
3. Act
4. Reflect

Look at the example below to see how the steps can help you and your children make goals.

1. Discover:

What do you need to improve or change?

My daughter is having a hard time in math. She asked me for help, but I am not good at math.

2. Plan:

What steps do you need to take?

I will talk to her teacher and other parents about ways to help my daughter with math.

3. Act:

Do you need more help?

I prayed for help. I felt like I should talk with a member in my ward who is a teacher. She said she will tutor my daughter. We set a time for them to meet each week.

4. Reflect:

What did you learn? Do you need to make a new goal or continue this goal?

I need to check in daily with my daughter to see how she is doing on her math assignments and review her notes.

Think and Pray

Activity

Think about something you want to improve or change. Use the first two steps to make a goal.

How will you improve or make the change? What steps do you need to take?

3. Act:

How has faith in Jesus Christ helped you reach your goal? Do you need more help?

4. Reflect:

What did you learn? Do you need to make a new goal or continue this goal?

Learn

Families can make homes places where the Holy Ghost can help them learn. They can talk about Jesus Christ and try to be more like Him. You can do many things to invite the Holy Ghost into your home and to keep your family strong. You can pray and read the scriptures as a family every day, live the gospel, and serve others.

When the Holy Ghost is in your home, your family will treat each other with kindness and love. When your children feel loved, they will feel the support they need to be successful.

These things will help your home be a place of love and learning:




- Be patient.
- Try not to get angry.
- Spend time together.
- Have fun.
- Listen carefully.
- Praise your children as they try to learn.
- Use kind words.

Help your children when things are hard for them. Here is an example of how you could show love if your daughter was having a hard time:

Your daughter took her big exam. She worked very hard. But she got a poor score and is sad. Now she will have to take the exam again in six months. You will also have to pay the exam fee again.

This is a hard thing. You and your daughter both feel sad. Here are some things you can say to her to show her love:

- I love you. I know you worked very hard. I am here for you.
- I am sad you didn't receive a high exam score. I know you feel bad too. What can I do to help you?

Use Time Wisely

Questions to Talk About

Learn

Time is a gift from Heavenly Father. We should think carefully about how we use our time. There are many ways to use time each day. We work, play, make food, pray, do chores, study, and do many other things. We must choose the best ways to use our time.

Make a plan to help you use your time well. Think about what you have to do each day. What things are most important? What things are not as important? Plan to do the most important things first. Use less time on things that are not important and that do not help you and your family reach your goals.

You and your family can talk together often about what is important. You can make a plan to help each other use your time wisely.

Think and Pray

Help Children Practice Reading, Writing, and Mathematics

Questions to Talk About

1. Look at these pictures. What do you see?
2. How do you think the children feel about learning?
3. How do you help your children learn every day?



Learn

Children learn many things at school. They can practice at home to help them remember what they have learned. Here are some ways to help your children practice reading, writing, and mathematics every day:

Reading

Reading is a very important way children learn. Parents can help their children understand how reading will help them in school and in their lives. Children can learn to read better by reading to themselves or out loud to others every day. You can ask your children to read to you while you make food or work in your home. You can also ask them to read words or verses in the scriptures. Older children can read to their younger brothers and sisters.



Writing

Writing can help children think and learn. As they write, children are able to share their ideas and use new words. You can ask your children to write a little every day. Some children like writing stories. Others like writing about things that happen to them. Ask your children to read what they write to you.



Mathematics

Learning mathematics skills is very important. These skills are used in building, cooking, and other parts of everyday life. Many children think mathematics is hard. But it doesn't have to be. You can help your children learn mathematics every day. Ask your children to count money or pay for things at the market. Ask them to count things at home or when you cook food. This will help them think about numbers and how they use mathematics every day.

Help Children with Schoolwork at Home

Questions to Talk About

Learn

Sometimes what your children learn in school is very hard for you to understand and help with. It is OK if you do not know everything. There are still many things you can do to help your children in school.

Schoolwork

Teach your children to work on their schoolwork every day. If your children have schoolwork that they need to finish at home, help them work on it. You can help your children make a plan to finish their schoolwork on time. It can help if children have a quiet time and place to study at home. You can help your children ask a teacher, friend, or another adult for help if their schoolwork is too hard.

Exams

Ask your children if they understand what they are learning. Ask them what they need to know for the exams. If they need help, you can talk to their teachers or have them ask their teachers for help.

You can help your children study for exams by having them answer past exam questions. You can also pray together for help. Try to give your children food and water before they take exams so they can think well and not be hungry. Tell your children that you believe in them and that you love them even if they do not do well on their exams.

Be a Part of Your Children's Education

Learn

You can talk with your children, work with them, play with them, read with them, and listen to them. This will help your children feel loved. You can also ask them what they are learning in school. Ask them what is easy for them. Ask them what is hard. Ask them how they feel about their teachers. If you think it could help your children, ask their teachers if you can speak with them.

Teachers often like it when parents talk to them and ask them how they can help their children do well in school.

Before you meet with your children's teachers, write down the questions you want to ask them. Here are some things you can do:

1. Thank the teachers for teaching your children.
2. Ask the teachers how your children are doing in their classes.
3. Ask the teachers how you can help your children do better in school.
4. Ask the teachers if there are important dates that you should know.

If you cannot meet with the teachers, you may be able to connect with them in one or more of these ways:

- Send a text message.
- Send an email.
- Have a phone conversation.
- Write a letter.

There are many people who help your children learn every day. Think of other people you can talk to about your children's learning.
