

In March, The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints bought the Kirtland Temple. This temple was an important part of the restoration of the gospel of Jesus Christ.

On April 3, 1836, Jesus Christ appeared to Joseph Smith and Oliver Cowdery in the Kirtland Temple. The Savior accepted the temple as His house. He then promised, "I will **manifest** myself to my people in mercy in this house" (Doctrine and Covenants 110:7). This promise applies to every temple today.

In the temple, you can receive answers to prayer. You can also receive faith, strength, comfort, knowledge, and power. Time in the temple will help you to think celestial and to see who you really are and who you can become. It will help you understand how you fit into God's magnificent plan. I promise you that.





Covenant Commitments

Bislama, English, and French are the official languages. Almost everyone speaks Bislama!




Coconut Cake

Coconut cake is a popular treat in Vanuatu. Here's a recipe you can try!

- 1. Whisk ½ cup sugar and ¾ cup melted butter in a bowl.
- 2. Add 2 eggs and mix.
- 3. Mix in ½ cup flour, 1 cup grated coconut, and 1 teaspoon baking powder.
- 4. Pour into a round greased cake pan and bake for 20 minutes at 300°F (150°C).


Notes and Rests






What Are Ordinances and Covenants?

An ordinance is a sacred act done with priesthood authority, like baptism and the sacrament. A covenant is a promise you make with Heavenly Father through a priesthood ordinance. Ordinances and covenants help us grow closer to Heavenly Father and Jesus Christ. Someday you can make more covenants in the temple.

- · This will be the first temple in Vanuatu!
- · It will be on the island of Efate, one of about 80 islands in the country.
- · The next closest temple is more than 700 miles (1,127 km) away in Fiji.



- · This will be the second temple in Tonga.
- The first missionaries came to Tonga in 1891. Now there are many members there.
- The king and queen of Tonga were at the groundbreaking of the temple construction.



FOR MOSIAH 4-6

Walk in His Footsteps

King Mosiah kept the commandments and "did walk in the ways of the Lord" (Mosiah 6:6). On a piece of paper, trace your foot and cut out the shape. Write on your footprint a way you can follow Jesus. Put your footprint where you can remember to follow Jesus Christ's example.

FOR MOSIAH 7-10

A Light in the Dark

Abinadi taught that Jesus Christ is "a light that is endless, that can never be darkened" (Mosiah 16:9). Hide an object in the house. Turn off the lights and have everyone try to find it in the dark. Then hide the object and try to find it with the lights on or with flashlights. Which way was easier? How does Jesus help us like the light helped you?

For younger children: Have your child practice turning on and off a flashlight or lamp. Then talk about how Jesus Christ is a light that can never be hidden or turned off.




FOR MOSIAH 18-24

Hearts Knit in Unity

Alma taught us to have our "hearts knit together in unity and in love" (Mosiah 18:21). That means we should work together and show love to others. Make a a string of hearts to remind you! Cut out some paper hearts and write a family member's name on each one. Poke a hole in each heart and put a

string through them so the hearts are connected. Hang up your string of hearts where you will see it often!

For younger children: Ask your child one thing they love about each person in the family. Tell your child something they do that shows love to others!


This story happened in Bolivia.

"Everyone teases me for being chubby," she said between sobs.


Thais wiped Nicol's face. "I'm sorry they said that. It doesn't matter what people think."

I would tell them that they don't have to be nervous. A calling is just a way you can help with Heavenly Father's work. The best way to help others is through your example!





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
I Can Follow Jesus by Taking the Sacrament

The sacrament helps me remember Jesus!


Activity Time
