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

Peace from the Temple


Years ago, my wife and I drove to visit the Idaho Falls Idaho Temple. Our four young sons stayed home with a babysitter.

Ordinance

An **ordinance** is a sacred, or holy, act done with priesthood authority in the name of Jesus Christ. Some examples are the sacrament, baptism, and confirmation.

Remission of Sins

When we repent and receive a **remission of sins**, we are forgiven for the wrong choices we've made. This is possible because of Jesus Christ.

Meek

To be **meek** is to be humble, mild, willing, and obedient. Jesus Christ set an example of this when He was on the earth.



Saints

In the New Testament, the **saints** were all those who chose to be baptized and join Jesus Christ's Church (see Acts 9:13). We use the same word for those who choose to be baptized into His Church today. A *saint* is someone who follows Jesus Christ.

The baobab is the national tree of Madagascar and can live for more than 1,000 years. A baobab tree provides people with fruit to eat, bark to make rope out of, and shelter from the sun.



There are many different types of lemurs. All of them come from Madagascar. Another animal from this country is the zebu, which is a type of cattle that people use for farming, milk,



You Can Follow Jesus Too!


There are many ways to follow Jesus. Write and tell us about a time you followed Him!

 Some stones weighed 5,600 pounds (2,540 kg)!
- It took 40 years to complete.
- Five artists were called on missions to study art in France. Later, they painted murals inside the temple.



Salt Lake Temple

- This will be the third temple in South Africa.
- Missionaries came to the area in 1852. Now South Africa has nearly 70,000 Church members.
- The nearest temple is about 795 miles (1,280 km) away, in Durban.



- This temple has six spires. The tallest is 112 feet (34 m).
- Some Saints rode on a bus for 26 hours to the dedication.
- When the Lima Peru Los Olivos Temple was dedicated, Lima became the first city outside of the USA to have two temples.



I was called to be a bishop at a hard time in my life. I was a young father with a family, and we had been struggling with money. I was exhausted. It was also hard for my wife.


One Sunday my dear wife was taking the sacrament. The Spirit helped her realize something. Many of the problems we had faced were solved at some point during my calling.


Come, Follow Me Activities

FEBRUARY 24-MARCH 2: DOCTRINE AND COVENANTS 18

Self-Portrait

"The worth of souls is great in the sight of God" (Doctrine and Covenants 18:10). That means everyone is important to Heavenly Father, including you! Draw a picture of yourself. Try decorating it with different art supplies! At the top, write "God Loves Me."

For younger children: Look in a mirror or at a reflection of you and your child. Practice saying "God loves me" together.



Listening Ears

Jesus Christ asks us to listen to Him (see Doctrine and Covenants 19:23). Good listeners remember what they've heard. Sit in a circle. One person whispers a gospel word. The next person repeats it and adds a new one. Go around the circle until everyone has added a word to remember!

For younger children: Teach little ones to listen by practicing how to follow directions, like folding their arms or clapping their hands. Let them have a turn to give directions too! MARCH 10–16: DOCTRINE AND COVENANTS 20–22

The Book of Mormon prophet Moroni buried the gold plates. The plates taught about Jesus Christ. They also told the history of Moroni's people.

As an angel, Moroni visited Joseph Smith. Moroni told him the gold plates were buried in the nearby Hill Cumorah. Joseph began translating the plates

by listening closely to the Holy Ghost. He also used special tools from God. He used a rock called a seer stone and a tool called the Urim and Thummim that had been buried with the plates.

1828

A COLOR

Twelve people saw the gold plates. One of them was Mary Whitmer. You can read the testimony of the other 11 witnesses at the front of the Book of Mormon. None of these people ever denied what they experienced.



The first translated copy of the Book of Mormon in English was printed in Palmyra, New York, USA.





Heavenly Father helped Joseph understand what the plates said. Oliver Cowdery helped write down what Joseph translated.

1830

The Book of Mormon now is read all over the world! It is translated into 115 languages. Missionaries share the Book of Mormon with everyone they can.

ASK HEAVENLY FATHER

After Joseph Smith received the gold plates, he started to translate them. Oliver Cowdery wrote down what he said. As they worked, they learned that Jesus Christ wanted everyone to be baptized.



Joseph and Oliver wondered who had God's power to baptize people. They went into the woods to pray and ask God.






As they prayed, an angel appeared. He said he was John the Baptist, who baptized Jesus Christ long ago. He gave Joseph and Oliver the Aaronic Priesthood so they could baptize others. The priesthood is God's power. It is used to bless God's children.



John the Baptist told Joseph and Oliver to be baptized. They went into a river and baptized each other. When they came out of the water, they were filled with the Holy Ghost. They were very happy!





Later, other angels came. Three of Jesus Christ's Apostles—Peter, James, and John—gave Joseph and Oliver the Melchizedek Priesthood. Now Joseph and Oliver could give the gift of the Holy Ghost to others.



Here are five things to help when you are feeling down.




PRAY TO HEAVENLY FATHER FOR HELP.
