



Indira looked down. She was not very nice to her family sometimes.




But maybe helping them could make her happy, like President Nelson said. It was one way she could follow Jesus. She wanted to try!



Kenya has two official languages: Swahili and English. Dozens of other languages are also spoken there.

Mamba

Children play this game throughout Africa. One player is the mamba (snake), and their goal is to tag the others. When a player is tagged, they become a part of the mamba by linking arms. Only the first person to be the mamba can tag other players. The last player left wins!



Chapati

This is a common food in Kenya. Here's a version you can try!

- 1. Mix 2 ½ cups (280 g) of flour, ½ teaspoon (3 g) of salt, and 1 tablespoon (8 g) of sugar in a large bowl.
- 2. Stir in about **1 ¼ cups (295 ml) cups of warm water** a little at a time. Roll the dough into six balls.
- 3. Use a rolling pin to flatten the dough balls into circles. Spread butter over each one.
- 4. Roll the circles into logs and shape them into spirals. Then flatten the spirals into thin circles with the rolling pin.
- 5. Cook in an oiled pan on medium heat on both sides until golden brown.


The **baptismal font** is where you can be baptized for people who have died. The twelve oxen around the font represent the twelve tribes of Israel.

Connected by Covenants



Covenants link us to Heavenly Father and Jesus Christ. By keeping our covenants, we can receive heavenly help and strength. President Nelson taught, "Once you and I have made a covenant with God, our relationship with Him becomes much closer. . . . Because of our covenant with [Him], He will never tire in His efforts to help us."*



What Is a Temple Sealing?





Mormon and the Gold Plates


You can read this story in Mormon 1-3.



Mormon was a prophet. When he was 10 years old, a leader named Ammaron told him to remember what happened to his people so he could write it on the gold plates later. The plates were what the Nephite prophets wrote on.



Ammaron hid the plates because many people were being wicked. He told Mormon where to find them. When Mormon was older, he got the gold plates. He kept them safe and wrote about his people.



The people were still wicked, but Mormon tried to teach them. He also wrote about the Savior on the plates. Because of Mormon, we can read the words of prophets in the Book of Mormon today.


For younger children:

"Good news!" she said. "I talked to the doctor at the children's hospital. They are going to help Alejandro. He will have surgery tomorrow."


Gerardo gave Mamá a big hug. "Heavenly Father is helping us! Can we pray and thank Him?"



GETTING A TEMPLE RECOMMEND

The year you turn 12, you will meet with your bishop or branch president to get a temple recommend to do temple baptisms. He will ask you if you have faith in Heavenly Father and Jesus Christ. He'll also ask if you are trying your best to keep the commandments. One question you *won't* hear is, "Are you perfect?" Heavenly Father knows that we will make mistakes. But He wants us to try hard to keep the commandments and make good choices. And because of Jesus Christ and His Atonement, we can repent when we sin and be clean again.



Tips for Your FIRST TEMPLE TRIP

In the temple, you can be baptized and confirmed for people who died without the gospel. Those people will have the chance to make a covenant with God and receive His blessings, just like you did when you were baptized and confirmed.

What to	Bring

Church clothes (wear them to the temple)

Temple recommend

Hairbrush and hair tie (if needed)

Family names printed from the FamilySearch app or website (optional)

What to Do

1. Enter the Temple

Show your recommend at the front desk. Then you can go to the baptistry. A temple worker will give you white underwear, socks, and a baptism jumpsuit.

2. Change Your Clothes

In the dressing room, change into the clothes you were given. Put your things into an empty locker. Then lock your locker and pin the key to your jumpsuit. If you have long hair, tie it back. Keep your printed family names with you.



3. Wait Reverently

While you wait for your turn to be baptized, you can read the scriptures, pray, or ponder. You can also think about the people you will be baptized for.

4. Participate in Temple Baptisms

When it's your turn, give your family names to the person at the desk. If you don't have names, they will use temple names instead. Step carefully into the font, where a priesthood holder will baptize you for each person. Remember to bend your knees and plug your nose as he lowers you into the water.

5. Change Back into Your Clothes


After you're done, someone will give you a towel. Back in the dressing room, you can shower in private, change back into your dry clothes, and do your hair. Be sure to put your wet clothes in the bin and leave your locker key in the lock.

6. Participate in Confirmations

Last, someone will lead you to a room where you'll be confirmed for those who were baptized.

Some temples may do things a little differently. But no matter what, there will be people to help you every step of the way. Remember, the temple is the Lord's house, and He is happy to have you there!

really admire her? She had never noticed that before.


