



## Martin’s Cove Trek Itinerary

In 1856, rescuers took shelter in Fort Semiinoe, but it was too small to hold the Martin Company. The rescuers assisted the handcart company members to a nearby cove for protection from the snow and wind. Explore Martin’s Cove and surrounding landmarks for a deep dive. You will trek in a loop from Fort Seminoe to Martin’s Cove and back to the fort. You may also explore other nearby sites that marked the trail for nearly 500,000 people who traveled along the overland trail from the 1840s through the 1860s.

Total walking distance: 6.5 miles

<p><b>Check-in</b></p> <p>Check-in at the campground after 1 pm.</p> <p><b>Optional Activities</b></p> <p>Visit other local overland trail sites, such as Independence Rock, Split Rock, Rattlesnake Pass, Fort Seminoe, Devil’s Gate, or the Martin’s Cove Visitors’ Center.</p>	<p><b>Trek</b></p> <p>Drive to the trailhead near Fort Seminoe. Pull handcarts in a 6.5-mile loop to Martin’s Cove and back.</p> <p><b>Optional Activity</b></p> <p>Square dance near your campground; you supply the music and the caller.</p>	<p><b>Checkout</b></p> <p>Checkout before 11 am.</p> <p><b>Optional Activity</b></p> <p>Visit Rock Creek Hollow and use an amphitheater for a devotional or testimony meeting.</p>
